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

Sheba Manab Kallyan Kendra (SMKK) is a non-profit, non-political voluntary development organization, established in January 1996 and working since the inception of the organization, it has been implementing integrated development projects/programmes with the poorer section of the community with particular focus to address the rights of children and women for bringing a positive change in their livelihood. Over time SMKK has gained experience and capacity by working on various development issues with technical and financial support from multifarious donors. It has gained a significant institutional competency to implement larger initiatives for achieving development objectives.

SMKK has a team of 384 staff and volunteers who are well qualified and experienced to project implementation of livelihood, vulnerable group development & empowerment for wider adoption by its target beneficiaries, thus enabling them to attain improvement of livelihood standard. The organization has so far been involving over 4,90,065 people through development initiatives presently being implemented.

SMKK strongly believes in target population concept for its basic development efforts in which the focus is the destitute and disadvantaged poor with emphasis on children and women. The organization follows regular monitoring, feedback, sharing experiences and immediate action for the successful implementation of the projects/programmes. It is dedicated to foster qualitative and quantitative improvement in the living standard of the target beneficiaries.

SMKK has a policy to work in that area where the people are comparatively more vulnerable. Its programmes specially targeted to ensure its support to establish rights of the women, adolescent girls and children to remove social injustice and bring a society free from discrimination.

Governance of SMKK


SMKK is governed by two- tier governing body and general by body governance system. The basic governance lies with the governing body of SMKK. It comprises of 7 members, including the Executive Director of the organization as an ex-officio member. Mr. M. Manjur Kadir is working as Executive Director. In addition to the general body there is an executive committee which is assisted by advisors.



Working Area

Over the years has grown into multifaceted development organization covering a total of 82 upazilas of 24 districts & 7 division and urban area 3 CC, 6 Municipality of the country till December 2018 and gradually expanding its programs to other areas.





Sectoral Accomplishments



Water and Sanitation (WASH):

During the period January 2019 to December 2019 SMKK has been focused on Water and Sanitation related interventions in both for Rohingya Refugee of Cox's Bazar and also other part of Bangladesh with the funding of different donors and Partners.

- Installed 71 Deep Tube-wells and supported for maintenance work.
- Constructed 74 double chamber wash blocks and provided with batching Materials.
- Installed 2 Water Pipeline Network and supplied pure water for 3000 HHs
- Organized 97 Awareness sessions and created awareness among more than 10000 beneficiaries on using safe water and good hygiene practices.
- Ensured pure drinking water and safe water for batching and house-hold works for 21750 HHs.

Health and Nutrition Sector:

During the period January 2019 to December 2019 SMKK has been focused on Health and Nutrition related interventions in both for Rohingya Refugee of Cox's Bazar and also other part of Bangladesh with the funding of different donors and Partners.

- Established 7 Health Camps/Health post in the Rohingya Refugee Camps.
- Provided free treatment and medicine to about 17250 patients.
- Provided free treatment and counselling to about 5000 poor and vulnerable people under free Friday clinic of SMKK
- Provided 95 ANC and PNC supports to 195 Pregnant women and 30 Lactating mothers.
- Provided support to 500 Lactating mother through social safety-net programs (Lactating mother program)
- Provided Hygiene Kits to 12000 HHs
- Organized 97 Awareness sessions on primary health Care, Nutrition and family planning and created awareness and sensitized more than 10000.

Psychosocial Support and Protection Sector:

During the period January 2019 to December 2019 SMKK was also focused on psychosocial supports and child protection related interventions in both for Rohingya Refugee of Cox's Bazar and also other part of Bangladesh with the funding of different donors and Partners.

- Established 38 of Child and Women Friendly Spaces (CWFS)
- Provided year-round Psychosocial Supports to about 1140 children
- Provided year-round snacks to about 1140 children to improve their daily food intake.
- Formed 38 Protection Watch Committee and Provided Training on Child Protection issues to 45 Volunteers.
- Formed and Functioned 5 adolescent clubs with 100 boys and girls for protection issues.

Education Sector:

One of the most prioritized objectives of SMKK is Education. During the reporting year supported to ensure education through its own funds and financial supports from its development partners.

- Ensure Primary and Pre-primary education for 300 Children
- Provided Non-formal education to 1140 Children
- Provided basic education for 1140 Rohingya Children
- Provided education materials to 1440 Children.

Agriculture, Livelihood and Food Security Sector:

During the reporting year January 2019 to December 2020 SMKK's implemented various activities to improve livelihoods and food security for the poor and vulnerable communities with the funding of various donors and partners.

- Supported micro-finance support to 203 poor and vulnerable women to start and re-start Income generating activities i.e. small shop, poultry farming, cow rearing, homestead gardening, fish farming and rickshaw/van pulling and improved their livelihood and ensured food security.
- Supported 100 Poor and Vulnerable women for homestead gardening and field crop cultivation in commercially.
- Provided cow to 15 Vulnerable Women to ensure livelihood security.
- Provided food support to 2560 Vulnerable women under govt. social safety-net program (VGD)
- Provided support to 25 small holders to cultivate Matla commercially
- Provided support to 15 small holders for fish farming commercially
- Provided support to 15 small holders for white fish and shrimp farming commercially
- Excavated/Re-excavated 4 Communal water bodies for irrigation and benefitted about 1000 farmers.
- Constructed 6 Micro Dam, 20 ring culverts attached with the sluicegate for agricultural development.





During the report year, SMKK organized different Human Resource and skill development training for the beneficiaries to increase their basic awareness, knowledge, behavior, attitude and entrepreneurship. Well designed training materials (mostly visual) were used for the target recipients and practical sessions were organized for the skill development training. SMKK hired some experienced resource persons from other organization besides its own training personnel. Regular mentoring and extension support and in some cases refresher training was organized for the beneficiaries.

- Provided Leadership development training to 100 Water Management Group Leaders
- Provided Agricultural Technical Training for 525 farmers.
- Provided Entrepreneurship Development Training to 95 Entrepreneurs.
- Provided Training to 38 Community Facilitators on facilitation and psychosocial treatments.
- Provided training to 50 staffs community mobilization, monitoring and Evaluation.
- Provided Training to 15 staffs on Gender and Development
- Provided foundation training for 10 staffs on good facilitation, occupational health and safety (OHS), Personal Protective Equipment using etc.

Disaster Risk Reduction and Emergency Response and Humanitarian Sectors

SMKK's mandates to quick response to any types of disaster occurred in operational areas. During the reporting period January 2019 to December 2019 SMKK mostly concentrated on Disaster Risk Reduction and Emergency Response, Humanitarian related activities through different projects with the funding and technical supports of various donors and partners.

- Developed 11 Upazila Based Disaster Preparedness Committee (UDPC) and provided orientation to 77 volunteers response against Super Cyclone BULBUL.
- Formed 38 Protection Watch Committee and Provided Training on disaster risk reduction issues i.e. land slide, earthquake and cyclone preparedness.
- Formed and Functioned 5 adolescent clubs with boys and girls and provided training to 100 volunteers on disaster preparedness.
- Provided Shelter kits/House-hold strengthening Kits to 1000 HHs
- Excavated and re-excavated 13 drainage channel
- Constructed 20 Pipe/ring culvert and 6 micro dam
- Provided emergency supports (Health, Wash, protection, solar energy and non-food items distribution) to 115275 Rohingya Refugees of Cox'x Bazar.

Climate Change Adaptation and Environment Sectors

- Planted and cherished 1000 coconut trees
- Planted and cherished 300 ornamental and 700 flowering plants
- Developed Horticulture Field and Planted Lawn grass/carpet grass to greenify the about 13000 Sqm areas.



As a humanitarian organization SMKK always emphasized on human rights, women empowerment, good governance and Gender development issues in its every single program.

- Provided orientation training to 25 staffs 50 Community Facilitators on human rights, women empowerment, good governance and Gender development issues.
- Ensured women participation in every event/programs
- Established 38 women and child friendly spaces and sensitized on GBV issues
- Prioritized PWDs and WWDs in selection its clients/beneficiaries in the committee or groups
- Distributed assistive devices i.e. walking sticks, wheel chair, hearing device, glasses to the 500 PWDs and WWDs.
- Formed 5 adolescent clubs and 38 Watchdogs with women leadership
- Established 'make-up corner' and providing make-ups materials especially for adolescent girl, female children and women.
- Provided Training to 180 Adolescent girls on family planning, personal hygiene, child marriage, human trafficking, Girls education etc.
- Organized/celebrated International Human Rights day and Women's day.

Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET)

Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) is one of the prioritizing areas of SMKK. During the period SMKK provided Technical and Vocational training on different Trades/Occupations under various projects.

- Provided Technical Training on Mobile Phone Technician (MPT) to 90 Un-skilled youth
- Provided Technical Training on Beautician (BTC) to 90 un-skilled and un-employed youth.
- Provided Technical Training on Tailoring/Sewing to 190 un-skilled and un-employed youth.
- Provided Technical Training on Basic Computer to 120 un-skilled and un-employed boys and girls
- Provided Technical Training on House Wiring Electrician to 40 un-skilled and un-employed youth.
- Provided Technical Training on Sewing Machine Operator (SMO) to 40 un-skilled and un-employed youth.
- Organized Work Place Based Training (WBT) for 270 un-skilled and un-employed youth.
- Wage based job placement for 165 graduates from different trades
- 97 youth Self-employed in different occupations i.e. Mobile phone technician, Beautifications, Tailor and Computer operators.
- Organized 3 Financial Linkage program for the Entrepreneurs to ensure financial supports for the graduates.
- Organized Training on Labor Rights and Decent Works for the employers of informal sectors.
- Organized Employers days with 300 Informal employers to advocacy for employment creation.






CASE STUDY

A Story of a Gloomy Face

A face shaded with obscure, somber, obsessed with marks of negligence; instead of going to play with friends or school or even without a happy family living she has to carry bale of vegetables on her little shoulder. She is Rozina, a 10 years old little kid. She has lost her father and at such an early age she looks after her family as there is none capable of helping them.

Rozina is a FDMN, came from Myanmar almost one year five month ago with her family including her mother and four sisters. Her father died of dieses when they were in Myanmar. One of her sisters got married after coming in Bangladesh. First six months their days were going well as they got enough living materials as relief to live on. She was going to learning center (LC) to gather basic knowledge then. After a certain period of time relief goods are provided decreasingly and those are not sufficient for them. She thought to do something since she was the younger one in their family and her older sisters are not supposed to get out because of their conservative nature derived from their religious belief. She started to sell vegetables to the community people. These selling stuffs i.e. potato, brinjal, chilis, radish etc. she collects from 'Kutupalong' local market in morning and then go to their community to sell them. So gradually it is being difficult for her to go to LC continuously as there is an obligation to attend LC on a definite time on a regular basis. Moreover, the LC is at such a distance she cannot go there after returning to home from vending. As a result, after some days she stopped to go to LC.



At that time, she found her neighboring children going in nearby SMKK WCFS (Women and Child Friendly Space), she also started to go there with them. Usually WCFS provide protection, safety, security to children and the CFF (child field facilitator) are responsible to take care of the children and make their mind cheerful by engaging them in drawing, preparing craft, giving playing kits and even by giving psychosocial counseling.

Rozina come to WCFS when she does not go for selling. She always had a dark shade on her face because of traumatized mental condition. After few days of coming to WCFS; she is getting closer with other children, playing with them, she is being bright day by day. She loves to do drawing. The CFF give her motivation not to be like gloomy again.

A ten years old children are not supposed to manage their livelihood. It impacts upon on their physical development as well as mental flourishment. It was quite challenging to heal up her inner depression and turn over from a stone-faced girl to a **Smiley** one but we put our **big efforts** to make small but **positive change**.



Saifullah, WCFS

Five-year-old Saifullah has found a supportive family in the Women and Child Friendly Space.

As the youngest of five children, Saifullah used to receive much of his parent's attention. Recently becoming a brother to another sibling, the attention Saifullah received from his parents lessened. Sensing this, Saifullah would leave his home, roaming the camp in search of friends and places to play.

Our Child Friendly Facilitator, Nigar, heard about Saifullah during a community outreach session. With a newborn baby, his parents were finding it difficult to keep track of Saifullah and give him the attention he needed. Saifullah had at times wandered off into the jungle or up onto the hills alone.

Concerned about his wellbeing, Nigar encouraged Saifullah's parents to let him join the sessions at the Women and Child Friendly Space, where Saifullah would be able to meet other children and play in a safe environment.

Initially nervous to join in with the other children in the Space, Saifullah now looks forward to the daily play sessions and is building his confidence with the support of Nigar – who Saifullah now calls 'apu'.



"I heard that he was roaming around several dangerous places - the forest, hilly areas which was very unsafe for him. I motivated him to come here and first few days i went to his house regularly to bring him there. After some days, he started chasing after me like always call me 'apu'. Now he has many friends here. His mental condition is far better than before."

"It is magical that Saifullah wants to go to your place [CFS] regularly. Usually he did not feel free to be harmonized with everyone, rather he has been very tetchy after this kind of displacement, he is less able to take mental stress. You really played an enchanted role."

Mohammed Hosen's health conditions put him at significant risk of developing other complicated health problems.

Aged 60, Mohammed Hosen's is troubled by a range of health issues, including skin disease, back pain and a condition that affects his eyesight.

With no immediate family, Mohammed Hosen is isolated. His health conditions make it difficult for him to travel to our health post. Whilst he cannot travel to our health post, he should not be ignored. Our Medical Officer and Medical Assistant are providing Mohammed Hosen with regular house visits for frequent check-ups. Our Medical Assistant is delivering medicine and ointment to Mohammed Hosen on a regular basis through outreach services and informing him of the correct dosage.

He has been receiving healthcare services from our health post for the past 25 days.

"I had been suffering from these painful diseases for so long and visited in another hospital in this camp. But that is very away from my residence and I did not get much care from there. Alhamdulillah! you [SMKK] are very cordial, caring and responsible too. Almighty Allah will save you, may Allah give you more strength to help mankind who are helpless, destitute like us."

Protection Watch Committee, Guide wall for the community....

In June, there was an incident like a bad guy entered into a house at midnight where there was an adolescent girl with bad intention. When the family member got to know, the bad guy fled away; immediately they called one of our protection watch committee member 'Solim' who was nearby. Solim went there and helped them to move somewhere else they preferred as they were being frightened for re-attack. The day after that solim sat with the protection watch committee about what to do in that issue and they all decided to took the family to CiC (Camp in Charge) to tell the event in details so that they got help. This is the best kind of protection assistance that they serve for the community and effective output of our protection watch committee.



"The community trust us that makes us more liable to protect them. These kinds of problem mostly arise at night where we all are at sleep. It will be better if you provide us some torch light with that we can give a round at the community at night."

"No Challenge can sustain in Good Works"-Adolescent Girl Club

A bunch of happy faces of adolescent club answered when they asked if they faced any challenges to participate in club and to conduct session in the community. Rabeya, Ismot ara, Sumaya bibi are some of adolescent girls' club who are very happy to be a part of this good initiatives for the betterment of their community. Usually they are used to stay inside the home all day long. They have less opportunity to take part in any friendly space because of social stigma.

"When our parents found that we get good information there about how to stay safe and secured, how we can protect ourselves from being abused and how to practice personal hygiene they did not restrain us from going there."—said Sumaya bibi.

According to them they do session in the afternoon when all of them finish their household chores and they disseminate massages through stories. If they directly conduct session community people seems to have less interest because the household member specially the women have many works to do.



"I surprised when I saw I did not know many things. What we thought before as challenging is not challenging at all. now when you people ask if we face any problems to conduct session or to go outside of the home, I found it very convincing for my family as they know I am doing nothing bad rather good work for me and for others. Still there is a challenge; to change the behavior and perception of the community that we are practicing for so long. It requires a long time to settle ideas. understanding and some practices." -Ismot Ara




