Background

Sheba Manab Kallyan Kendra (SMKK) is a non-profit, non-political voluntary development organization, established in January 1996 and registered with the competent authority of the Government including NGO Affairs Bureau, Bangladesh. It's main office is based in Bagerhat and a liaison office in the Dhaka and also operated its field offices strategically located in different districts of Khulna, Barisal, Dhaka, Rajshahi and Rangpur divisions.

Given the situation of mass poverty in the country and lack of resources and its effective utilization, SMKK undertook multifarious development projects/programs since its embarkation and working with the poorer section of the community with particular focus to address the rights of children and empowering women for bringing a positive change in their livelihood. It has also been actively engaged in the fields of education, livelihood, health, water and sanitation, HIV/AIDS, human rights and social justice.

Over time SMKK has gained experience and capacity by working on various development issues with technical and financial support from different national and international donors including Winrock International, USAID WFP, DFID, FAO, SDC, DANIDA, EC, WorldFish Center, HOPE'87-Austria, Islamic Development Bank, Muslim Aid-UK, Bangladesh NGO Foundation, STROMME Foundation, MWA, BRAC, CODEC, NGO Forum DWSS, UNICEF, Islamic Relief, Bangladesh Bank, LGED, DAE, BWDB, CARE Bangladesh, UNDP, Winrock International India, SONNE International Austria, Pubali Bank Limited, The Art of Living Foundation & UNEP. Many of those were continued for long term duration. It has gained a significant institutional competency to implement larger initiatives for achieving development objectives.

SMKK has a team of 399 staff members who are well qualified and experienced in the field of livelihood improvement, agricultural technology transfer, business development, human resources development and training, vulnerable group development & empowerment for wider adoption by its target beneficiaries, thus enabling them to attain improvement of livelihood standard. The organization has so far been involving over 3 million people through development initiatives and able to changes in the lives of disadvantaged people.

The organization has a pool of experts who are involved in providing technical supports, particularly in the areas of baseline study, institutional development training, disaster management and climate changes.

SMKK has experience in implementing income generation activities through offfarm and agro based technology transfer, including Agriculture, Fisheries, Forestry, Livestock, home based IGA operated by women. SMKK has been working for women empowerment through raising their awareness and involving in different income earning activities and linked with micro finance for startup capital. Educating the adolescent girls, especially school dropped girls of poor families on reproductive health and hygiene, personal and social safety and rights. It has also long working experience in building institutional capacity development of the rural community people to address social issues through collective efforts. Participatory approaches are being followed to identify issues and action-oriented program implemented to address those issues that hindered the process of their development.

SMKK strongly believes in target population concept for its basic development efforts in which the focus is the destitute and disadvantaged poor with emphasis on children and women. The organization follows regular monitoring, feedback, sharing experiences and immediate action for the successful implementation of the projects/programmes. It is dedicated to foster qualitative and quantitative improvement in the living standard of the target beneficiaries.

SMKK has a policy to work in that area where the people are comparatively more vulnerable. Its programmes specially targeted to ensure its support to establish rights of the women, adolescent girls and children to remove social injustice and bring a society free from discrimination.

Objectives of the Organization

The long term objectives of the organization include;

- To build awareness of the people about socio-economic structure and their role in the development process;
- To encourage people to come under SMKK umbrella to overcome the existing situation and improve livelihood;
- To eradicate poverty by utilization of internal and external resources;



- To educate illiterate children and men & women;
- To initiate institution building campaigns;
- Campaign anti-drug education and to aware about AIDS & STDs;
- To improve health care facilities, MCH and FP services;
- To rehabilitate the affected victims of women & child trafficking & acid burns;

- To implement pilot projects for employment for the target beneficiaries;
- To afford access of the target beneficiaries to NGOs and govt. facilities;
- To carry canal digging for reserving water irrigation.

Vision

The long term envision of SMKK is empowerment of its target beneficiaries through education, health services training and development approaches ensuring social and economical development for the disadvantages and destitute and remove sufferings of the resource poor people.

Mission

The mission of SMKK is guided in providing technical & financial supports enabling the target beneficiaries to involve themselves in various development programs to create income and employment opportunities for their sustainable development.

Strategies

Implicit in the programs strategy is a belief in the efficacy of strengthening the demand side of the services equation based on felt needs of the target beneficiaries. The strategy of the development and training programs included the following:

- To provide the target groups with different need based training for improving professional efficiency;
- To organize groups for the target male and female beneficiaries both in the urban and rural areas;
- ❖ To promote awareness through education, training and exchange of technical know how for sustainable development;
- To mobilize youths for playing effective role in socio-economic development activities leading to self reliance;
- To create opportunity for exploring and mobilizing locally available resources;
- ❖ To undertake different government programs for raising awareness of the target beneficiaries emphasizing on employment, health, sanitation, food value, safe drinking water, MCH & FP, protection of environment and other programs for community development;
- To ensure women participation in the development activities and raising awareness for preventing child abuse; cruelty on women, strengthening sound gender relation, increasing income of women through various IGAs;

- ❖ To afford access to the target beneficiaries to NGO and Government operated credit facilities for income generating activities;
- ❖ To establish contacts with credit and other support services offered by the NGOs, Government agencies, international donors etc.

The Ideologies following by SMKK

- ❖ Participation in decision making and promotion of participatory approaches at all levels
- Self evaluation and constructive criticism
- Mutual respect, unity, discipline and mutual cooperation
- Honesty, transparency and accountability at all level
- Dedication and sincerity

Governance of SMKK

SMKK is governed and managed by a team of bodies and committees as per provision of its constitution. At the top, SMKK is governed by the General Committee, comprising of 17 members. A powerful Executive Committee (EC) consisting of 7 members elected by the members of general committee. The EC is headed by one Chairman and assisted by 6 Directors and responsible for overall planning and management of the organization.

For effective management of the project, sub-committees are being formed by the Executive Committee and the decentralized management practices are helping in expediting project implementation. Executive Committee usually organizing regular meeting for planning, reviewing, providing guidance to the Executive Director in allocation of resources, coordination and implementation of projects and taking strategic decision for the organization.

Annual General Meeting (AGM) are being held once in a year where the Chairman of the EC presents annual progress and financial reports and keep informed to all the members of the general committee.

Board of Advisors

SMKK is also guided by an advisory board comprised by 7 senior and renowned personalities who proven expertise in their respective field. They are working voluntarily and dedicated their time and contributing in planning and management of the organization. Their valued expert services are highly appreciated and SMKK feels honored for them and recognize their sincere services for the humanity.

Projects Implemented so far by SMKK

project have so far Totally 82 implemented by SMKK since its inception under the technical and financial assistance of national and international donors. Most of the projects were targeted to reduce poverty generation through income of employment opportunities. Some projects were exclusively targeted to rights, education, water, sanitation and health related activities, transferring of knowledge and skills among marginal families for and



undertaking different agricultural and non-agricultural income earning activities as the major focus area for addressing poverty at individual level and contributing to the national development processes. Also some projects were short-term and those were addressing the immediate need of disaster victims of the SIDR and AILA.

Through those projects, more than 2.1 million beneficiaries were supported; among them about 85% were women. It has been revealed from different studies carried by the internal and external evaluation that significant changes are witnessed in the livelihood of the beneficiaries. SMKK has given special attention to attain self

reliance by the individual and community through their group initiative. Community led approaches has been cultured and supported during implementation of the project that helps in sustainable development among the beneficiaries.

SMKK also tried to provide support in linking with other NGOs for sustainability and established a viable linkage with government service providing department, especially for agricultural technology transfer, water, sanitation, health and nutrition services for ensuring supports to the beneficiary after withdrawal of project funding. SMKK has given utmost responsiveness to ensure proper service delivery to the target beneficiaries. All the projects were successfully implemented and highly appreciated by the concern funding organization.

As a part of humanitarian activities, relief and rehabilitation work has been carried out in AILA affected areas like previous year and provided support in restoration of the lives of the disasters victims. The devastations of SIDR and AILA was quite different in nature and intrusion of saline water totally disrupted normal life of the affected areas but it is a matter of fact that the wreckages and long term effect on the

people could not drew the attention of the humanitarian national and international organization and no such rehabilitation programme were carried out like SIDR.

The indefinable sufferings of the affected communities' have created massive economic vulnerability as the damages were quite much higher in some places. SMKK tried to bring the issues to the organization and individuals for their active support and some resources were allocated for the area. The table presenting the activities those were carried out to support the AILA affected people.

Programmes and Activities of SMKK

SMKK's activities mainly are divided into two broad category; Training and Development programs. To achieve the development objectives of the organization, SMKK have been offering skill development training courses to the beneficiaries; men, women, adolescents and youths belonging to poor and disadvantaged families of both rural and urban areas. Some short term special courses have been organized aiming to create immediate employment opportunity of the trained beneficiaries. Trained members got employment support services including micro-credit or are assisted to have links with other institutions for employment.

A separate training unit has been established within the organization under the leadership of one coordinator and technology based training equipment and other

logistics have been arranged for all training centers. For capacity development of the concern staff members, in-house and external training organized for improving training skills. In most of the technical courses, concern public and private recourse persons are usually been invited. Module and methodologies are regularly reviewing for making of learner's friendly training.

The Spread of SMKK Operational Area

Increasing demand and with the expansion of the project area, SMKK's services has been reached to the communities of 387 villages of 38 upazilas under 15 districts. About 35,320 new families have been additionally included duri8ng the reporting year and supported for improving livelihood situation of the poor and extreme poor families. Preference were given to include women and children and mostly from the natural shocks prone area.

The rapidly expanding series of development programs were targeted to draw the attention of beneficiaries for which a numbers of poor people are seeking support form SMKK as the organization has not given to operate micro-finance rather providing services for increasing business opportunities. Disaster Response in the SIDR and AILA affected areas

It is an un-debated issue that the country frequently confronts severe disasters almost every year with heavy loss of lives and resources, coastal area in particular. SMKK's disaster unit is closely working with the communities for preparation of community led action plan for disaster preparedness and planning for alternate options in mitigation and absorption of the shocks. SMKK's interventions on DRR thus aim at improving living conditions of



the people by reducing vulnerabilities to disaster through building the capacity of people to get prepared for facing disaster, efficiently manage the situations during hazard, and to find out ways for early recovery. Mobilizing the communities on disaster preparedness, and make them aware on the importance of acting collectively at the time of hardship.

SMKK was closely involved in rescue and relief operation in the SIDR affected districts and mainly carried out those activities in the Bagerhat, Khulna, Pirojpur, Patuakhali, Barguna, and Jhalokathi districts and massive rehabilitation programme were carried out which included shelter construction and reconstruction, installation of tube wells and sanitary latrines, distribution of agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizers, organized training for fish farmers and distributed fish fries, and juveniles of prawn. Distributed cows, goat and poultry birds among the poor families within the disaster affected districts. Those activities have created a positive impact among lives of the disaster victims and supported in restoration of normal life. However, some rehabilitation prgramme in the field of agriculture has been continuing especially for the poor farm, families.

Similarly, SMKK rushed with its all out support immediately after May 25, 2009 when the AILA hit the southern coast and created a massive destruction in the communities that it ripped through. The losses of lives was not so high but in has devastated the property in terms of material and livelihood. This disaster mainly destroyed normal lives through saline intrusion and damaging of crop fields. Scarcity of drinking water is also becoming a big problem in the AILA affected areas.

During the year 2011, SMKK implemented several projects under the financial assistance of Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) of the United Nations, and support from EU, DAE, DoF & DLS and STROMME Foundation, CODEC & Pubali Bank Ltd. The project has been implemented under Khulna, Bagerhat, Pirojpur and Barguna districts and supported resource poor farm families through distribution of inputs and interest free micro-credit for undertaking agricultural activities for improving their livelihood.

A total of 8,299 households are benefited from the project titled "Support to Assist Landless, Marginal and Small Farmers to Overcome Soaring Input and Food Prices in Impoverished Areas Area of Bangladesh" assisted by FAO and 2,800 farmers are benefitted from the project, titled "Immediate Assistance to Restore the Livelihoods of Women and Fish Farmers Severely Affected by Cyclone in South Western Bangladesh". Both the project was successfully implemented and overall situation of the target population has significantly improved.

Another project was implemented in Bagerhat and Pirojpur district under financial assistance of The Art of Living Foundation & UNEP against the project of Coconut Tree Plantation Program under Billion Tree Campaign in which 200 families were involved in the project activities.

SMKK has strengthen its service delivery approaches in the coastal district and working closely with the communities through mobilizing them in formation of groups and providing proper guidance in accumulation of savings for generating their own capital which would be a source of fund during the shocks.

The group members are attending informal traini8ng that are enhancing their skill and knowledge. The field staff of the organization is working to establish linkages with local Disaster Management Committee at the union and upazila level and providing services to increase the access in different public and private agencies. By the end of December 2011, a total of 20,700 beneficiaries from Bagerhat, Pirojpur and Barguna districts have received micro-credit for starting different IGAs. The project has been implementing under the funding assistance of STROMME Foundation, CODEC & Pubali Bank Ltd. Besides, 315 beneficiaries from Pirojpur and Bagerhat have received interest free micro-credit during same period. These projects have contributed in improving the livelihood situation of the poor and extreme poor communities.

Activities for Disabled People

During the year 2011, SMKK implemented activities for disabled people to increased their socio-economic condition. The mention below activities has done during the last year;

Training Programmes

During the year, SMKK organized different human and skill development training for the beneficiaries to increase their basic awareness, knowledge, behavior, attitude and entrepreneurship. Well designed training materials (mostly visual) were used for the target recipients and practical sessions were organized for the skill development training. SMKK hired some experienced resource persons from other organization besides its own training personnel. Strong emphasis was given to utilize the knowledge in their daily life to increase income. Regular mentoring and extension support and in some cases refresher training was organized for the beneficiaries.








A total of 20,103 beneficiaries were trained on 24 courses under 4 sectors during the reporting year, out of which 13,441 (67%) were female and 6,662 (33%) were male.

Sector wise trained beneficiaries are mentioned in the following figure.


selection For of training participants, a care selection process was followed, especially for the off-farm IGA. Physical facilities in operation of the selected trade, its market financial opportunity and considered capabilities are during the process of selection. These exercises have prevented misuse of resources and more than 85% trained beneficiaries have utilized their skills. Similar approaches also applied for other agricultural training.



Follow-up services were rendered at the community level for ensuring proper utilization of the skills and micro-finance supports were given to the trained beneficiaries. A strong business development services have also been provided to establish a market linkage with the input supplies and bulk buyers. For agricultural activities, local officials from DAE, DLS and DoF were invited in the training courses

and a viable linkage have established that enabled the beneficiaries for taking necessary technical advises and when required. These approaches also help sustainability of project activities and long term impact has been created.

As it has been mentioned, SMKK has been working to empower the women and providing necessary support in increasing their awareness, skills, knowledge and income



earning opportunity. A comparison of training participants on different sector is presented in the following figure.

All the off-farm IGA training was conducted with practical demonstrations and on spot assessment was carried out and repetition on the session was done to provide exact skills that needed to operate the training. It was greatly considered that the illiterate participants should acquire adequate skills from the training that will help them in running the business successfully and would be able to compete with other business operators.

Under the project of Urban Partnerships for Poverty Reduction (UPPR) project, a total of 2,000 women from Rangpur, Dinajpur, Gazipur & Savar Pauroshova took part in skill development training on different home based IGAs. The training was organized in close cooperation of the Pauroshova authorities and CARE project staff members.

Highlights of the project implemented for improving livelihood

During the reporting year, some 24 projects are being implemented by SMKK out of which a few projects were started in previous year. Brief discussions on those projects are noted in following section.

Support to landless, marginal and small farmers to overcome soaring inputs and food prices in improvised areas of Bangladesh.

The FAO-EUFF Project, GCP/BGD/043/EC was awarded by Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations which is funded by European Union and implementing to support AILA affected poor families. Through the project, a total of 8,299 poor and marginal farmers of Dighalia Upazila under Khulna District & Rampal Upazila under Bagerhat district are being supported for undertaking agricultural activities aiming to improve their livelihood situation. An amount of Taka 6,523,524 has been utilized for project from the period from July 2010 to June 2011. Following services have been delivered to the selected beneficiaries;







- Transferred agricultural technology through training and extension support to assist landless, marginal & small farmers.
- Support landless, marginal & small farmers through distribution of agricultural inputs
- Establishment of sustainable market demand and marketing demand of the farmer's field product.
- Provided necessary support for income and self employment opportunities of the farmers.
- * Extended supports for re-starting of unutilized pond/ditches and Ghers for fish culture.

The following activities are being carried out to achieve the planned results of the project

Distributed saplings of fruit trees, spade, watering can, secateurs, vegetable seeds & NPKS among 4000 farmers.

- → Distributed carp/GIFT fish fingerlings, lime, fish feeds, fertilizers among 470 Farmers.
- → Distributed materials, like CI sheet, bamboo for repairing or construction of cow shed and a cow with feeds to 70 farmers.
- → Distributed goat shed materials like CI sheet, Bamboo and goat including feed among 200 farmers
- Distributed poultry shed materials, 13 chicken + 2cock and feed 150 kg each among 500 farmers.
- **⊃** Distributed rice/pulse seed (BRRI-28/47), Urea, TSP, MoP among 1,000 farmers
- **⊃** Distributed maize seed & fertilizer among 55 farmers
- Distributed mechanized fishing boat, life jacket, torch light to 5 fisherman groups.
- Distributed 64 Power Tillers & 16 Power Thrashers for using by farmers.
- → Distributed 10 Low lift pumps for Irrigation that has been covered the crops field of 250 farmers.
- **⊃** Distributed fresh water prawn PL, feed, lime & fertilizers to 600 farmers.
- ⇒ Provided skill development training to all participating farmers







The immediate outcome of the project can be summarized as follows which has been assessed through regular monitoring of the performance at the field level.

- Livelihood of the targeted poor farm families has been improved.
- Unutilized and underutilized pond/ditches and Ghers are brought under fish culture.
- Income and employment opportunities have greatly been increased through fisheries, agriculture & livestock activities.
- Nutritional intake has been improved at the poor farm families.
- Supply of animal protein in the local market and in the country is increased.
- Strengthened the capacities of the targeted farmers.
- Increased agricultural production.
- Reduced poverty and improved socio-economic status.

Immediate Assistance to Restore Livelihoods of Women and Fish Farmers severely affected by cyclones in South Western Bangladesh.

The project was implemented under the financial support of Taka 840,000 (administration cost) and Input support near 30 million taka from the Spanish government through Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) of the United Nations and provided services to 2,800 poor and marginal farmers of Morelgonj upazila of Bagerhat district and Mothbaria upazila of Pirojpur district. The overall objective of the project was to restoration of the livelihoods and improves the food security and nutrition of women and fish farmers living in the severely disaster affected communities in south western coast of Bangladesh.







The following activities are being carried out to achieve the objectives of the project

- Organized technology transfer training on fish culture and poultry rearing for undertaking income generation activities by the landless, marginal & small farmers.
- Support landless, marginal & small farmers through distribution of agricultural inputs including fish fingerlings, lime, fertilizer and fish feeds, chicken, materials for shed repairing and poultry feeds.
- Provided extension services to all target beneficiaries.
- Established close linkages with the Department of Fisheries (DoF) and Department of Livestock Services (DLS) for necessary technical assistance to the beneficiaries.

The services delivered through project have significantly improved the livelihood and increased nutrition intake by the members of the targeted families. The technology for improved culture of fish and poultry farming has widely been popularized in the community and many neighboring families are replicating the technology.

Micro Finance for Income Generation Activities and Rural Agricultural Credit Program

The program is supported by CODEC/STROMME Foundation and Pubali Bank Limited to open an opportunities for starting and/or re-starting income generation activities for improving overall livelihood situation of the poor and marginal families. This initiative for disbursement of micro-credit to the poor farmers was started in the year of 2006 as pilot basis. The ultimate results in poverty reduction through supporting in increasing agricultural production were found to be highly effective and now the program has been extended other area. Currently the program is successfully operating in 18 upazilas under Pirojpur, Bagerhat and Barguna district. Some basic information of the program is as follows:

- Fund received so far from CODEC/STROMME Foundation: BDT 10,100,000
- Fund received from Pubali Bank Limited: BDT 4,000,000
- Total amount disbursed till December, 2011: BDT 98,257,680
- ❖ Total amount realized as of December, 2011: BDT 85,679,927
- Number of families covered: 6,048
- Outstanding as on December, 2011: BDT 12,577,753
- Operational areas: 18 upazilas of Pirojpur, Bagerhat and Barguna districts

The prime objectives of the micro-financing program were to;

- Support the poor and disadvantaged families in improving livelihood through micro financing in undertaking income generation activities.
- ⇒ Help in generation of income and employment opportunity for the poor families.
- Reduce dependency on the traditional money lending practices with higher rate of interest.
- Create facilities of income and employment opportunities.
- Help in accumulation of saving fort building own capital







For achieving the objectives, following activities have been carried out and facilitated the poor and disadvantaged families in generating their own savings fund to reduce the dependency on the external support that will help them in standing as self help group.

- Assessed physical and financial feasibility at individual level and Scope of women employment and role of female members in operating the IGA.
- Identified the individual interests to operate self employed income generation activities.
- Assess funding requirement, cost-benefit ratio and opportunity of expansion of the business.
- Provided market information and supported in establishing linkages with different market actors.
- Established linkages with other micro financing institutions.

IGAs Selection Planning and Management (SPM) Training of Group members under Micro-credit Programme

STROMME Foundation & CODEC allocated 29,950.00 BDT for Leadership and capacity building training on Income Generating Activities during 5 to 9 December, 2011 at Nesarabad upazila under Pirojpur district.

Interest Free Micro Finance to SIDR affected Families

Considering the existing situation in the SIDR affected areas, SMKK has undertaken a program to disburse interest free micro credit among the most vulnerable families in the most affected areas. The program also supported by CODEC & STROMME Foundation, NGO Forum, EC and MISEREOR. This initiative helped the recipients in starting and/or restarting of home based income generation activities and contributed in reducing food insecurity. The program only covered the beneficiaries of Nesarabad upazila under Pirojpur district which is inadequate to meet the demand. An amount Taka 392,500 has only allocated for the program and it has already been proved as an effective tool for improving livelihood of the most vulnerable disaster affected families, especially the women headed families. Though it was a beginning of the program that has been initiated and the fund is being used as revolving credit fund and necessary steps are take to ensure maximum utilization of the resources and try to manage more funds to cover more areas.







The ultimate objective of the initiative was to provide financial support to the victims of SIDR and AILA who had lost their assets and have no capacities for (re) starting their income earning activities and usually have no alternative source of managing fund. The specific objectives of the project are;

- **⊃** To create employment and income opportunities for the most vulnerable families affected during SIDR.
- **⇒** To create alternative livelihood options through self employed business
- **⇒** To reduce dependency on the external relief assistance
- → Improve livelihood situation.

Following activities have been carried out to achieve the planned results;

- Selected most vulnerable families with special consideration to women headed families through active partition of community people.
- Disbursed interest free micro credit among 315 poor families affected during Sidr.
- Provided extension and business development services to the credit recipients for operating profitable IGAs.
- Established linkages with other micro financing institutions

Low Cost Housing Program for poor families

Housing for the poor communities is a major concern as they have lack of resources

to invest for construction of house. Low cost housing program has been started by SMKK in the year of 2003 under the funding support of Bangladesh Bank (Grihayan Tahabil). This is long term project through which credit supports are being provided to the poor families with less interest and flexible repayment facilities. Till end of December, 2011, a total of BDT 4,750,000 has so far been disbursed.



The project is being implemented at the Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district and Betagi upazila of Barguna district and during the year 34 poor families have been included for the housing support.

Since the operation of the project, it reveals from the monitoring report that the utilization and repayment of the fund is highly satisfactory. Bangladesh Bank authority extended their support and expressed their satisfaction on the performance and given commitment for continuation of the project. Through the project, one of basic need of human being has been fulfilled and dream of poor families is becoming truth.

Organizing Skill Development training under the project of United Nation's Urban Partnership for Poverty Reduction (UPPR) Project and contracted by CARE Bangladesh.

The UPPRP, a project is being implemented by the UNDP is close collaboration of LGED and Municipal authority, aiming to reduce the poverty of urban poor and extreme poor. SMKK was awarded a contract for organizing skill development training for the project beneficiaries under Savar, Gazipur, Rangpur & Dinajpur Pauroshova.

An amount of Taka 4,780,206 was allocated for the training of UPPRP beneficiaries on different off-farm income generation activities. All the trades were selected based on the suitability for operating by the trained beneficiaries. SMKK engaged specialized Master Craftsman for conducting those training in all pourosovas. The activities were successfully carried out with the active cooperation from the management of UPPRP, CARE and Municipality.

The overall objective of the training program was to reduce poverty and hunger for poor and extreme poor people living in urban areas by increasing their incomes and assets and the specific objectives were to;

- Create access to wage employment by increasing the technical capacities of poor and urban poor people living in urban areas and linking them with appropriate sources for employment; and
- Build capacities of peri-urban poor and extreme poor people to engage in small enterprise, agro development processing.







To achieve the object and respond in the term and conditions for the assignment SMKK developed training manual for all the training detailing the course curriculum including methodology. Emphasis was given to impart the training that helps the target participants for acquiring best skills and knowledge. All the training was conducted by using demonstration, practicing and learning. Necessary skills on budgeting and market planning, business linking with input suppliers and bulk buyers also being done. Best efforts were dedicated to make the training program successful and it is anticipated that the trained beneficiaries would be able to utilize the skills for their livelihood improvement. Market linkage and market development supports were given to the beneficiaries. The skill development training was conducted for following trades.

- Jute crafts training
- Beef fettering training
- Bamboo crafts training
- Door mat training
- Coconut fiber crafts training
- Earthen crafts training
- Block batik training
- Food processing training
- Tailoring training

Vulnerable Group Development (VGD) Program

The VGD program is being implementing at Mothbaria upazila under Pirojpur district under the award of Department of Women Affairs (DWA) for a period of 2 years started from July, 2010. Total amount allocated for the project was Taka 1,915,900 in which Taka 957,950 has been utilized during the reporting period.



The objectives of the project are;

- ❖ To improve overall socio-economic conditions of the VGD beneficiary women.
- ❖ To build income-earning capacities of VGD women
- ❖ To empower the VGD beneficiaries through awareness training
- To build skill through IGAs training

Under the scope of work, following activities are being carried out to achieve the planned objectives.

Provided training on social awareness.

- Increases awareness on STI/AIDS through informal learning sessions and organize awareness campaign against STI/AIDS
- Imparted training on income generating activities.
- Provided support and motivation for saving & credit management

Water Management Improvement Project (WMIP)

Under the financial assistance of World Bank and Netherlands through Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB), the project in being implementing at Kolapara upazila of Patuakhali district for s period of 5 years and has been started during middle of the year. Toal allocation of fund is Taka 360,000.

The objectives of the project are to;

- → Improve national water resources management by involving the local communities to play an expanded role in all stages of the participatory scheme cycle management (PSM), from planning and design to operations and management.
- **○** Enhance institutional performance of the Country's principal water institutions, particularly BWDB and WARPO.
- ⇒ Reduce vulnerability and enhance livelihood opportunities for the beneficiaries through increased food production and favorable environment for improved water resources management.
- → Capacitate project's operational management by the local stakeholders.







The following activities are carried out to achieve the expected results of the project

- Organized Water Management Group (WMG) and Water Management Associations (WMA) mobilizing the local community where WMG & WMA do not exist.
- Re-organized and strengthening the Water Management Group and Water Management Associations where those are exist but are not strong enough to function.
- Mobilized, motivated and aware the beneficiaries to develop their sense of ownership and responsibility about the schemes.
- Develop capacity of the WMG and WMA members through training, meeting and workshop so that they can self run the WMG and WMA.
- Provided necessary supports for sustainability of Water Management Organization.

Education for Adolescent Girls (Songlap Program)

The Songlap program has been implementing under the financial assistance of STROMME Foundation & CODEC. The project was started in the year of 2008 and continuing as agreed by the management of both organizations. Currently, the project has been implementing at Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district. Total amount of Taka 1, 167,340 was allocated against the project and out of which Taka 847,500 has so far been utilized during the reporting year.

The project is addressing the most demand based issues as a significant percentage of the population are young and adolescents and most of the rural adolescents have no or less education and knowledge on the safety, health and hygiene issues that are mostly relevant to their present and future life. Even the ignorance of the parents in arranging early marriage and its consequences can be more threat in the life of the adolescents.







However, through the Songlap Program, a section of the community are becoming aware on the life skills and practicing in their life that is ultimately securing their future. This is one of most appreciable and result oriented program of SMKK

The objectives of the project are;

- To improve the awareness of the adolescent girls and change their role in the society as change makers
- To improve women rights in the community and prevention of STI/AIDS
- ❖ Increase knowledge on reproductive health and hygiene practices of the targeted adolescent's girls.
- Increase awareness on the human rights and other social issues

The following activities are being performed to achieve the planned results.

- Organized education for adolescent girls following adult literacy curriculum
- Organized awareness of the community people regarding women rights and importance of girl's education.

- Provided necessary support to reduce early marriages in the project area.
- Raining awareness on STI/AIDS and re-productive health.

Non Formal Education

The Non Formal Education Program has been lunched under the financial assistance of STROMME Foundation & CODEC and implemented at Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district.

Through the project, community based education program has been carried out to prevent dropping out of the children and provided necessary support for enrolling and continuing their education in the mainstream schools. The specific objectives of the program were;



- To prevent dropout of the poor children from regular education
- To improve education in the community.
- Provide active support for continuation of education of the children of poor families

To achieve the objectives of the program, following activities have been performed in the working area and a remarkable success has been observed in the communities and rate of dropout is reduced as zero percent.

The activities were

- Provided necessary support to 90 children who were dropped out form the regular education including educational materials.
- Teaching them from class 1 to 3 in this center
- Organized community awareness campaign on importance of education and role of parents

Quality Education Program

The Quality Education Program has also been lunched under the financial assistance of STROMME Foundation & CODEC for a period of one year and implemented at Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district.

With the aim of providing quality education to the young learners, a learner's friendly education curriculum has been introduced through which the young learners from the poor families are found to be capable in building a foundation of formal education. Training was organized for the Teachers and school management committee members and holding parents meeting.

The specific objectives of the program were;

- To ensure quality education in the community register primary school.
- * Provide active support for continuation of education of the children of poor families
- ❖ Improve quality of primary education.

Adequate measures were taken to improve the school management which are identified as B & C grade registered primary school improvement through training to the management committee of the schools and supported with Class equipment & materials support and organizing annual cultural & sports program for improvement of the teaching environment. It revealed that those activities have increased the enrolment of the students and overall results of the young students has been showing a positive trend.

Education Support Program (ESP)

Poverty is closely linked with education as the human poverty leads to the other root causes of poverty, thus SMKK strongly believes in education and this is one of the important areas of the organization. A special attention was given to impart the lessons of education through formal and informal sessions and focus was given to the dropped out children in bringing back them in formal education.

The schooling program was started in the year of 2006 under the financial support of BRAC and will be continued till end of 2012. The organization is trying to mobilize more resources for operating more schools in other area. The school program currently running at the Rampal upazila of Bagerhat district and Taka 721,927 has been utilized during the year. The specific objective of the programs is;

- * To prevent dropout of the poor children from regular education.
- Provide active support for continuation of education of the children of poor families.







To achieve the planned results of the program, following activities are being carried out during the year.

- Provided necessary support to 450 children who were dropped out form the regular education including educational materials.
- First phase 300 children 10 school center and 2nd phase 150 children 5 school center.
- Organized community awareness campaign on importance of education and role of parents.

Pre Primary Education Program

In rural areas, pre-schooling is not usually being practiced because of facilities and affordability of the poor families. Pre-schooling is one of the effective approach to induce the children in schooling and it would change the behaviors of the children as well as the parents. SMKK tried to create a suitable environment among the communities to make them understand about its effectiveness and



ultimate results. Though the program, the parents of the children of early aged are convinced for sending their children in the non-formal school which will lead the young learners for their formal education. The program was piloted through own funding from the SMKK and implementing in Betagi, Bamna, Nesarabad, Kachua, Bagerhat Sadar, Sharankhola upazila of southern districts. Following are detail of the program. The program aimed to increase literacy rate among the poor communities and ensuring 100% education for the children who are at the age of 6-10 years. Following activities are being carried out for achieving the planned goal of the program.

- Provided child education for children of women beneficiaries who involved SMKK micro-credit program.
- ❖ A total of 5, 600 children were educated under this program since 1998
- Each micro-credit group used their school center and SMKK field level staffs were involved as teachers of those centers.
- SMKK also supported through distribution of books, pencil, note book and others materials.

Local Poultry Farming for ultra poor

Under the financial support of Bangladesh NGO Foundation, SMKK is implementing a project for income generation through rearing of local poultry birds. The project will have no operational cost, e.g. feeding cost but after rearing of 6-9

months, the beneficiaries will have some income to support their family as well as this will help in increasing nutritional intake. The project was started in September, 2009 and ended in December, 2011 and utilized an amount of Taka 500,000. The project was provided support to 100 poor families under Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district.

The specific objectives of the project were;

- ❖ To reduce poverty and increase income of the extreme poor families.
- To increase nutritional intake of the target families
- To build their skill on local poultry farming.

Though this a traditional IGA and almost all families in the rural areas have local poultry birds but due to lack of proper care, like feeding, safe housing and vaccination, mortality was high and laying performance is lower comparative to the hybrid poultry. To increase the production of local poultry birds and reduction of vaccination, necessary knowledge was transferred to the beneficiaries. In addition, following activities were performed to achieve the better results.







- Provide 2 days long training support on local poultry farming for 100 beneficiaries.
- Distribution of poultry cages each beneficiaries 1 cage.
- Distribution of 9 hens and 1 cock total 10 to each beneficiary.

Free Friday Clinic Program

Health and affordability for treatment of the poor families is still a major concern as those families have no enough resources for managing fees of the physician and cost of medicines. The initiative was taken to help the poor and distressed people for their treatment of some common diseases. This is not a large program but have a good impact in the community. People, who have no money for their treatment, now are getting proper health care support from the organization. The program is running under Nesarabad upazila of Pirojpur district & Betagi upazila of Barguna district through utilizing own fund of SMKK and active cooperation from the doctors of the respective upazila.

Under the program, doctors are attending in a selected spot in each Friday and checking the health of the poor men, women and children free of cost and some medicines are distributing among the patients. The program is highly appreciated by the community people. Besides, some other health related issues were addressed to create awareness among the community people.

- Awareness raising of the adolescents on reproductive health, role of youth, potential threat of STD and HIVs, effect on the family life, society and long term impact of the diseases.
- Organized courtyard sessions with the parents to aware on nutrition and primary health care.

Coconut Tree Plantation Program

Under the financial assistance of United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) & The Art of Living Foundation, coconut saplings were distributed among 200 community people of Nesarabad upazila under Pirojpur district & Sharankhola upazila under district. This initiative is expected to be improving the ecological balance and also contribute in additional income. Local DAE officials have



provided technical assistance to the people in plantation and caretaking of the coconut trees.

Reproductive Health Program

The program has been implemented under Morelgonj & Rampal upazila of Bagerhat district to increase awareness of the adolescents on reproductive health and hygience issues, safety and security and the role of the youth ion family and society. The program is funded by SONNE International Austria for a period of one year.



National Domestic Biogas and Manure Program (NDBMP)

Under the financial assistance of Netherlands Development Corporation (SNV) & KFW through Infrastructure Development Company Limited (IDCOL), the program was initiated to all working upazila of SMKK in popularizing the domestic biogas and manure program. The objective of the program is;

❖ To generate employment of the rural women and to enhance their income by 15-20%

- ❖ To ensure economic use of poultry litter and cow dung
- To install a biogas plant and establish gas connections to poor rural households
- ❖ To save 1/3rd of the cooking time of the focused group and 5-7 kg of fire wood per family per day
- ❖ To reduce health cost of the focused group relating to respiratory and other health related problems associated with cooking.







To achieve the planned results of the program, following activities have been carried out;

- Baseline survey and beneficiaries selection for bio-gas setup
- Beneficiaries training on ecological balance, how to bio-gas plant, how to use cow dung and poultry litter & cooking.
- Installation Bio-gas plant.
- Distribution bio-gas plan and training to beneficiaries on bio slurry uses.

Fidya Distribution Program (UK)-2010

Under the financial assistance of Muslim Aid UK, The program is implemented in the Koira Upazila under Khulna District. Total fund support 550,000 BDT. Benefited beneficiaries 1375 household

The objective of the project:

- To help cyclone Aila affected poor household
- Food support among cyclone Aila affected poor families







Allocation of NGO staff capacity building training on Disaster Risk Reduction (DDR)

Under the financial assistance of Muslim Aid UK, The program is implemented in the Bagerhat District. Total fund support 19,500 BDT. Mani activities of the programme staffs training for capacity building on Disaster Risk Reduction (DDR)



Training on Early Childhood Development Program including Preprimary Education under PROTEEVA project

Under the technical and material assistance from Save the Children SMKK implementing in the community pre primary education under PROTEEVA Project, Project location Nesarabad Upazila under Pirojpur District, Total center 2 and children 60.

The objective of the program;

- o To reduce Illiteracy and increase literacy in poor community.
- o To build their educational capacity and prepare their primary school education







Feed the Fasting Program under Ramadan Program

Under the financial assistance of Muslim Aid UK, The program is implemented in the Bagerhat Sadar. Total fund support 29,000 BDT

CONCLUDING WORDS

As a development organization, SMKK is committed to its target communities in eradicating their poverty and trying to address multifarious socio-economic issues which are encumbering the process of development. The Baseline Survey is a prime tool to learn about existing situation and also necessary to assess the needs of the target group and to determine what was important for facilitation of effective implementation of the project. Through household level survey, discussions with community members and key informants and relevant stakeholders, the survey provided benchmark information on the variables/ like levels of awareness/knowledge of community members on their rights and legal issues, their vulnerability to violence, overall existing pattern and prevalence of violence in the community, access to and availability of support services, which would be used for assessing the project impact. This information would help develop a vulnerability mapping for the purpose of determining appropriate intervention spots.

Similarly, outcome survey, periodic review and mid term evaluation and end evaluation will help in understanding about the effectiveness, efficiency, performance level, deviation and what extent the services are given that is relevant for the sustainability.

SMKK has given much importance on baseline study and performance evaluation at different stages of the project implementation to improve the service delivery mechanism. These strategies are also improving the competences of the staff members through the feed back and lessons sharing from the evaluation. As usual, the overall performance of the projects implemented during the year was found to be highly satisfactory. The project coordinators, assigned for each project and the field team have shown their dedication in accomplishing their duties and tried to complete all planned activities within the time frame allowed for the project.

SMKK has running with the support from different national and international development partners. It is absolutely a non profit organization and has no large fund for undertaking long term program for the target beneficiaries. Therefore, SMKK is placing its appeal for financial assistance from institutions and individuals to support in the development initiatives that urgently needed to support the disaster victims and other vulnerable communities.

SMKK has experienced and dedicated staff members who are committed to their jobs and the organization follows the strategy of human development for which we can assure that any resources received from the donors would be best utilized. Our financial management is more transparent and audited by the competent Chartered

Accounting Firm in each year and has no restrictions for any donor agencies for verification.

We have strong relationship with the local administration and local government that privileged to ensure our services to the most deserve beneficiaries without any discrimination. We tried our best to reach the most vulnerable and deprived people and stands besides their initiative with our limited resources.

To reduce the gap between the well to do people and resource poor, many issues like reduction of poverty, gender discrimination, child labor, polygamy, early marriage, school drop-out, ill health, malnutrition, reproductive health and hygiene management for the adolescents and women, maternal mortality, pre and post natal care, under weight birth of babies, domestic violence and violence against women, safe drinking water and sanitation, unemployment and under employment and many others need to be addressed to improve the livelihood of the people, peace and harmony in the society.

SMKK has persistently trailing forward to overcome those issues which are mentioned above. SMKK need cooperation and sharing of other development partners for consolidation of their hands. We acknowledged patronage and encouragements received all way long from a host of national and international friends and development partners and hoping their continual support in coming days as well.
