Sheba Manab Kallyan Kendra (SMKK) is a non-profit, non-political voluntary development organization, established in January 1996 and working since the inception of the organization, it has been implementing integrated development projects/programmes with the poorer section of the community with particular focus to address the rights of children and women for bringing a positive change in their livelihood. Over time SMKK has gained experience and capacity by working on various development issues with technical and financial support from multifarious donors. It has gained a significant institutional competency to implement larger initiatives for achieving development objectives.

SMKK has a team of 384 staff and volunteers who are well qualified and experienced to project implementation of livelihood, vulnerable group development & empowerment for wider adoption by its target beneficiaries, thus enabling them to attain improvement of livelihood standard. The organization has so far been involving over **4,14,565** people through development initiatives presently being implemented.

SMKK strongly believes in target population concept for its basic development efforts in which the focus is the destitute and disadvantaged poor with emphasis on children and women. The organization follows regular monitoring, feedback, sharing experiences and immediate action for the successful implementation of the projects/programmes. It is dedicated to foster qualitative and quantitative improvement in the living standard of the target beneficiaries.

SMKK has a policy to work in that area where the people are comparatively more vulnerable. Its programmes specially targeted to ensure its support to establish rights of the women, adolescent girls and children to remove social injustice and bring a society free from discrimination.

The poor and extreme poor people would be capable of building sustainable socio-economic status through active participation in diversified social actions.



Human Resource Development /Capacity Building



During the year, SMKK organized different Human Resource and skill development training for the beneficiaries to increase their basic awareness, knowledge, behavior, attitude and entrepreneurship. Well-designed training materials (mostly visual) were used for the target recipients and practical sessions were organized for the skill development training. SMKK hired some experienced resource persons from other organization besides its own training personnel. Strong emphasis was given to utilize the knowledge in their daily life to increase income. Regular mentoring and extension support and in some cases refresher training was organized for the beneficiaries.

A total of beneficiaries were trained on 20 courses under 6 sectors during the reporting year, out of which 101,81 were female and 2,910 were male.

selection of training participants, a care selection process was followed,

especially for the off-farm IGA. Physical facilities in operation of the selected trade, its market opportunity and financial capabilities are considered during the process of selection. These exercises have prevented misuse of resources and more than 85% trained beneficiaries have utilized their skills. Similar approaches also applied for other agricultural training.

Follow-up services were rendered at the community level for ensuring proper utilization of the skills and micro-finance supports were given to the trained




that enabled the beneficiaries for taking necessary technical advises as and when required. These approaches also help in sustainability of the project activities and long-term impact has been created.

As it has been mentioned, SMKK has been working to empower the women and providing necessary support in increasing their awareness, skills, knowledge and income earning opportunity.

DRR, Emergency Response and Humanitarian Assistance

One of the prime strategic objectives of SMKK is reducing risk through disaster risk reduction initiative which is one of the cross-cutting issues for any development activities. During the reporting period a number of aspects have been identified to effectively increase resilience and decrease vulnerability of communities to natural disasters. Approaches must be flexible and holistic, and they must include the innovative use of adaptable structural and non-structural measures. Gaps include the adoption of a systems-based perspective, a focused and results-based approach, and building of broad partnerships and stakeholders for the implementation of the complete cycle of disaster risk management areas (prevention, preparedness, response, recovery and reconstruction) to reduce losses from the occurrence of cyclones, floods and droughts. SMKK's mandates to quick response to any types of disaster occurred in operational areas. Since its inception SMKK ran huge number of operations in coastal region of Bangladesh.



Capacity Building and education:

In line with SMKK's mission statement to contribute to the capacity building of the organizations engaged in integrated community development, SMKK introduced skill development and management courses in order to develop skill manpower especially the women workforce. Over the period SMKK conducted hundreds of courses for young women entrepreneurs and farmers.

Shupal Biswas, age-25, Village: Joukhola, Union: Baghutia. Upazila: Aghoynagar, Jessore. Lives with his parents. read in Masters.

Singari Local Advisory committee (LAC) selected shupal as a Peer Leader for Joykhola ELTE Women Group Through the Feed the Future Bangladesh, Women's Empowerment Activity of SMKK by the process of collaboration CAA dated on 20/2/16.

His father is a farmer; He is living two brothers with his father & mother. Beside his study he helps his father of agricultural works. As a peer leader he got the opportunity for 337 Beneficiaries house hold profile data entry by the Tab devise and before he received a two days training on Tab Base data entry from Winrock International.

At the end of the Work Tab Base data entry he earns money 16,850/- (Sixteen thousand eight hundred fifty) from Winrok International and It was first time in his life, his father and mother are very happy and pleased their son. Shupal Jointly purchases a power tiller of his first-time income. He thinks that this business will come through of his family's economic solvency.

He says that, he has been able to learn about the data entry work and he has been gained a great experience. He was able to recognize of his own area. very happy to work of his own community and he is more interested to work community as a peer leader.

He is thankful to SMKK for changing his life through training and all others supports.



Success stories

**Jhorna Rani Biswas (Age 37),
Husband of
Santos Biswas lives in
Monirampur**

Upazila, Jessore with her husband one son and only daughter. She got married at the age of 15. She has to stop her education after completing class one. Her



husband is a poor farmer and has to manage his family poorly with poor income. They had 30 decimal cultivable but most of the time it was unused they only depended one crop which was rice production.

So, Jhorna Rani used to stich Nakshikantha and earn about 400-500 Taka a month to support her husband.

In December 2015 Jhorna Rani came to know about Feed the Future Bangladesh Women's Empowerment Activity project from Ms. Khadija Khanom, Field Officer of SMKK and showed interested in involving with the project. In January 2016 she participated in the Community Asset Appraisal (CAA) and the LAC member selected her as an ELTE member. Jhorna Rani received 7-month long

Entrepreneurship literacy and empowerment (ELTE) training from March 2016. Meanwhile she also received Agricultural Technical Trainin(ATT) from


ACI. Every day, **"JHORNA RANI CAN TAKE FAMILY DECISION"** after training she have been shared training related issues with her husband. Her husband Santos Biswas was interested in the training of his wife, he was also admitted to the male's ELTE group and took part in 7 months of ELTE training and also received ATT. Being involved with such kind of training they decided to do increase their family income through increasing agricultural products. They took lease another 35-decimal cultivable land and started to farm the total of 65 decimal land. Earlier Jhorna did not work in the crop filed but after receiving the training she also started working in the crop



field

with her husband. They cultivated gourd, egg plants and yard long bean in their crop field

adopting improved technology they learnt from the ATT and EDT during the period. According to her statement "In last season we have earned around 25,000 takas by selling the vegetables and we do not have to buy vegetables. From the earned money she bought a cow for beef fattening. Jhorna Rani said that "I can take takes a decision of what kind of vegetables will be cultivated during the vegetable cultivation sessions. Other Female ELTE members of her village are inspired by her involvement in agricultural sectors and earnings and started taking IGAs like Jhorna.
